

Eligibility for U.S. Scholar Programs

- U.S. citizenship
- Degree as required by award
 - Ph.D. or other terminal degree may be required
 - Many awards in the Core Program are open to applicants with a Masters and professional or academic experience – see Award Description for details
- Open to professionals and artists outside academia recognized professional standing and substantial accomplishments
- Teaching experience as required by award
- New policies on previous Fulbright Scholar grants and waiting periods between grants







Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program Overview

- Supports teaching and/or research activities for three to 12 months
 - Flex
 - Multi-country
- Open to all disciplines
- Apply to specific award with proposed project, hosted (in most cases) by higher education institution in country
- Application deadline: August 1







Why Sub-Saharan Africa?



- Generous grant benefits, including living and housing allowances and dependent tuition allowance for most awards
- In-country support from U.S. Embassy staff
- High potential for broad community engagement and lasting impact
- Unique and transformative experience








Selecting the Right Award

- Narrow your search by region, country, discipline or keyword
 - Discipline preferences listed in the award
 - All Disciplines awards
- Relevance of the project to the country; why will host country benefit from your project?









Teaching in Sub-Saharan Africa

- Open to professionals, independent scholars and all levels of academia
- Teaching Activities
 - Teach undergraduate and graduate courses
 - Assist in the development or revision of curricula
 - Contribute to faculty development or training; give seminars, workshops, and public lectures
 - Supervise student research projects and serve on student thesis or doctoral dissertation committees
- Invitation Letters
- Making Contacts
 - Award description
 - Fulbright scholar directory
 - Existing networks







Research in Sub-Saharan Africa

Africa Regional Research Program

- Award #9465-MC
- Open to all disciplines
- Increase or develop new contacts and intellectual ties between U.S. and African communities and contribute to scholarship on Africa
- Flex option available
- Multi-Country options
 - Choose 1-3 countries with active Fulbright U.S. Scholar programs (except South Africa)
 - Research-only for South Africa? See separate South Africa awards.







Language Requirements

- French Language Ability Required:
 - **Benin**: French required except for teaching American studies and linguistics
 - **Burkina Faso:** French required except for teaching American studies and linguistics
 - Cameroon: varies per institution
 - Cote d'Ivoire: French preferred
 - Democratic Republic of the Congo: French fluency required
 - Guinea: French required except for teaching American studies and linguistics
 - Madagascar: All teaching will be in English; conversational French in helpful
 - Mauritius: All teaching will be in English: knowledge of French is an advantage
 - Niger: French required except for teaching American literature
 - Senegal: French required except for teaching American literature
- Portuguese Language Ability Required:
 - Mozambique: Portuguese language fluency required
- Additional Languages
 - Kenya: All teaching will be in English; Swahili will be useful in social settings.
 - Malawi: All teaching will be in English; basic Chichewa will be useful in remote areas
 - **Sudan:** All teaching will be in English; working knowledge of Arabic is an advantage
 - Tanzania: All teaching will be in English; scholars advised to take Swahili classes to prepare

Application Components

- Application Form
- Project Statement
- Curriculum Vitae or Resume
- Course Outlines or Syllabi (for teaching awards)
- Select Bibliography (for research awards)
- Letters of Reference
- Additional Components, Depending on Award
 - Language Proficiency Report
 - Letter of Invitation
 - Supplemental materials for applicants in the Arts, Architecture, Writing and Journalism







Submitting a Competitive Application

- Fulbright goal: promote mutual understanding
- Why you are interested in a Fulbright in the proposed host country
- Professional expertise and skills you can offer; benefits to the host institution and host country; exchange of knowledge and experience
- Cultural diplomacy; demonstrated flexibility, adaptability
- Outcomes, impact, and multiplier effect
 - For your professional development, home campus, students, discipline; for your host institution
 - Future collaborations; linkages: personal, professional, institutional; plans for sustaining relationships
 - Internationalizing campus and curriculum







Affiliations and Invitations

Grant Locations:

- If a host is identified, it will be found under Location
- When a host is not identified, there are several resources to help find an affiliation:
 - International office on your campus
 - U.S. and Visiting <u>Fulbright Scholar Directory</u>
 - Review award description for suggested hosts or resources

Letter of Invitation:

- Non-binding expression of interest from proposed host abroad
- Should come from person with whom you will be collaborating
- Should be on host institution letterhead







Review Process and Timeline

AUG.

Program staff conduct technical reviews for completeness

SEPT.

Discipline-specific committees review applications

SEPT. – EARLY NOV. U.S. peer review committees discuss applications for a single geographical region

NOV. - JAN.

Applicants notified of status - Recommended applications are sent to host countries and to the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship

FEB. - MAY

Grantees notified of final approvals

MAY - JUNE

Grant packets sent to grantees
