- In partnership with 160 countries worldwide, Fulbright offers passionate and accomplished faculty, administrators, artists, journalists, lawyers, and other professionals from all backgrounds an unparalleled opportunity to study, teach, or conduct research.

#### A BRIEF HISTORY

- Established in 1946 by Congress, Fulbright is the United States government's **flagship international educational and cultural exchange program.**
- Fulbright is sponsored by the U.S.
   Department of State with funding provided by the U.S. Government and administered by the Institute of International Education.

- Strengthen a **network** of professionals, practitioners and researchers from the United States, Canada, the Kingdom of Denmark (including Greenland and the Faroe Islands), Finland, Iceland, Norway, Russia and Sweden
- Interdisciplinary and multinational research teams will address policy and research questions related to promoting Arctic Security

#### Research Themes



- Scholars will engage in collaborative thinking, analysis, problem-solving and multi-disciplinary research in three main thematic areas:
  - Climate Change and Arctic Resources
  - Arctic Security and Governance
  - Mental Health and Well-Being
- Applicants will select a theme and explain how their research fits into these overarching areas of inquiry











#### **Program Activities**

- 18 months: September 2024-April 2026
- Three in-person seminar meetings
- Individual Fulbright research exchange visit (1.5 3 months)
- Monthly Webinars
- Ongoing thematic group collaboration
- Research Themes:
  - Climate Change and Arctic Resources
  - Arctic Security and Governance
  - Mental Health and Well-Being

#### A. Group Work

- White Paper
- Diverse Stakeholder Listening Sessions
- Policy Brief
- Manuscript for Publication

#### **B.** Individual

- Research Exchange Visit (1.5-3 months) –
   Between October 2024 and January 2026
  - U.S. grantees will complete exchange visit in an Arctic member country
  - Non-U.S. grantees will complete exchange visit in the U.S.
- Individual Exchange Report
- Poster for public exhibition











## Fulbright Arctic Initiative IV Eligibility Criteria



- Arctic Council nation citizenship and residency
- Expertise and relevant experience in one of the identified research areas
- Open to exploring and incorporating comparative, interdisciplinary approaches through collaborative activities









## Fulbright Arctic Initiative IV Eligibility Preferences

- Early or mid-career academics, applied researchers and/or professionals with research experience in the public, nonprofit, or private sector
- A Ph.D. or equivalent professional/terminal degree is preferred
- Candidates who have not previously received a Fulbright Scholar grant
- At least four of the scholars will be selected from the United States; at least one scholar will be selected from each of the other Arctic Council member states.











#### Financial Award and Benefits



- \$40,000 (USD) grant award per grantee
  - Supports travel to group program meetings, travel and maintenance for the individual exchange visit, research materials, and assistance for grantee
- Accommodations and meals for full group seminar meetings are provided independent of the grant award
- Limited accident and sickness benefit while on exchange or participating in program activities

### **Application Components**



#### **Requirements:**

- Biographical, Academic and Professional Background
- Project Statement (3-5 pages)
- Curriculum Vitae or Resume (up to 6 pages)
- 2 Letters of Recommendation
- Language Proficiency Report (non-U.S.)
- Letter of Invitation (optional)
- Bibliography (up to 3 pages)

**Portfolio submissions** (for artists, architects, and journalists)











## Tips for a Strong Application:





Before you start, **read the award description carefully** to ensure
you meet all requirements and
your proposed project is possible.



Start application and enter referees' information as soon as possible.



**Take advantage of IIE resources**, including webinars, application guidance and products from prior cohorts on our website.









## Tips for a Strong Project Statement

- ▲ Ability and experience performing teambased collaborative research
- ▲ Connection to program themes
- ▲ Plans for engaging with local stakeholders
- ▲ Potential impact and outcomes in both selected research theme and more broadly across the Arctic
- ▲ Plans for dissemination

MAY	Final Review Committee. Recommended applications are sent to the Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board. Finalists notified of selection decisions
