INTRODUCTION

The Fulbright Program



- Established 1946 to expand and strengthen the relationships between the people of the United States and citizens of the rest of the world
- Sponsored by U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs and administered by the Institute of International Education's Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES)







Scholar-In-Residence Program

- Serings scholars and professionals from abroad to campuses that do not often host visiting scholars
- Involves colleges and universities that serve student populations underrepresented in international exchange programs
- S-I-R grantees
 - Primarily teach undergraduates
 - Provide cross-cultural/ international perspective



- > Application is made by the interested U.S. institution
 - I semester or full academic year options
- Deadline is November 1; Email: sir@iie.org







Program Benefits: Increased Mutual Understanding and Globalization

- Host institution gains new knowledge, new courses and new energy from scholar
- Scholar's collaborative relationship with host institution and colleagues in-country results in continued dialogue and exchange
- Experience impacts scholar's field, career, home institution and home community
- Outcomes and Impact:
 - Internationalizing campus and curriculum
 - Education Abroad program
 - Virtual Exchange/online courses
 - MOU initiatives

- Community Colleges
- Small Liberal Arts Colleges
- Rural colleges and universities

Institutions may also consider partnering with other institutions in their area



- Application Form
 - Responsible Administrative Official
 - Principal Contact for Academic Arrangements
 - Program Dates
 - Financial Support (cost share estimate)
 - Scholar Requests (named/recruited)
 - Proposal Summary (700 characters)







Narrative Proposal Part 1

- Institutional Profile (4-5 pages or 7-8 pages for joint proposals)
 - Institutional Information
 - Size and characteristics of student body and faculty
 - Location
 - Mission
 - Scope of academic offerings
 - Community resources
 - Current International Programs

Short and Long Term Internationalization Goals and Objectives







Narrative Proposal Part II

- Proposed Program (8-9 pages or 12-13 pages for joint proposals)
 - Oversight
 - Who on campus will be responsible for what during the scholar's visit?
 - Academic Program of Scholar
 - Most important element of the proposal, what will the scholar be teaching while on campus?
 - Scholar qualifications/experience
 - Plans for Other Campus Activities
 - Community Outreach
 - Professional Enrichment
 - Sustainability
 - Duration of Grant Period
 - Financial Support







SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE

The Scholar

- Naming a Specific Scholar
 - OV and Letters of Recommendation
 - 2 letters of recommendation
 - One letter should come from someone who can speak to the scholars teaching ability
- Requesting Recruitment of a Scholar
 - Choose up to two countries within World Region
 - > Outline information about the scholar to be recruited
 - Credentials
 - Desired discipline(s) or specialization(s)







Supplemental Materials

Letters of Support

- At minimum a letter from Administrative Official
- No maximum
- Seek out letters from institutional representatives and community partners
- Sample Syllabi or Course Outlines
 - Outline the course(s) the scholar would teach
 - Leave off any institutional policies or boiler plate text







Review Criteria

- Proposed teaching and curriculum development plan is feasible and aligns with short and long term goals and objectives
- Other campus activities provided for to ensure the scholar will engage with other departments and individuals on campus
- > Types of **Community Outreach/Engagement** Activities
- Suitability of the Named Scholar
- Campus support for the scholar
- Professional Enrichment opportunities for the scholar outlined
- Sustainability of the scholar's work on campus and the impact of in the surrounding community

D. Community Outreach

<u>Public Education</u>: In 2018, the U.S. Department of Education awarded \$13 million for partnerships for New Orleans universities to impact K-12 education in the city. Xavier University was one of the higher education institutions to be selected as a recipient. Xavier's department of Education recently launched its Doctorate in Educational Leadership to transform the quality of public education in the city and to better equip principals and school administrators. Mr. Sannon is an expert in educational models in public school education. Through the Division of Education and Counseling's existing partnerships with K-12 schools, Mr. Sannon will collaborate with faculty and graduate students in these programs on existing public educational initiatives.

<u>Consortia University Education</u>: The *XUTULAC* partnership is a collaboration between Xavier University and Tulane University on Latin American and Caribbean area studies initiatives. The S-I-R can be used as an expert as part of this effort. Additionally, students all New Orleans universities can take courses at Xavier and vice versa because of a consortia agreement in place after Hurricane Katrina. Both Loyola University (private) and the University of New Orleans (public) have programs in Latin American studies. Dillard University, another HBCU in New Orleans also partners with Xavier on a number of initiatives. Through the consortia, interested students at other universities can enroll in the course the S-I-R will teach but also attend all the university and community programming that will feature the proposed S-I-R.

<u>City Activities</u>: Xavier University is one of the founding members of the Mayors New Orleans-Haiti Historic Task Force. The task force can benefit from hearing from the S-I-R from ways in which both communities can mutually work together in areas of mutual interest, using the expertise and resources of institutions like Xavier in that effort.

<u>Community Groups</u>: *Nola4Haiti* is a committee of professionals with ties to Haiti either through heritage, charitable work, or professional work with Haiti. The committee includes representatives at universities, in the private sectors, in the media and in the non-profit sector. The committee engages in both charitable and cultural exchange to bring both New Orleans and Haiti together in solidarity, particularly in post-disaster recovery context.

Sustainability

The S-I-R's visit will:

- Solidify the AADS core course: AADS 3070: Latin American and the Caribbean. Now that the Afro-Latin American and Caribbean studies program has launched, this course can then be cross-listed for both programs.
- Identify projects, institutions and resources for the creation of a Center for Afro-Latin America and the Caribbean.
- Create and encourage Xavier-led study abroad programs in the region, that are taught and facilitated by Xavier faculty, practical and affordable for Xavier students, and can increase Xavier student's exposure to the region and use of foreign languages, and enhances Xavier students marketability upon graduation because of their international exposure to the region. At the end of the S-I-R's stay, the university should have a memorandum of agreement with a Haitian institution for both faculty and student educational exchanges.
- Support and synergize faculty projects and research taking place in the region by connecting faculty together in support of the university's developing emphasis in the region.
- Expand the applicability of Xavier's Confucius Institute to include Chinese
 populations in the region and current Chinese government supported initiatives in
 Latin America and the Caribbean.
- Strengthen Xavier's relations with private, public and community sector groups doing work with Haiti, positioning Xavier within the community as an academic designate for work in Haiti.
- Elevate Xavier's position within the academic community about instruction, research and initiatives in Haiti and the Caribbean, particularly with communities of African descent in the region.






